DID YOU KNOW?

Our Club was started in a Community Hall in Padbury in 1973, but by 1976 membership had grown to 136 members. As the hall was too small to accommodate more members, membership had to be refused. It was therefore necessary to look for another facility.

A block of land was donated to the Club by the WhitfordS Shopping Centre administration in 1978. The land lay idle for a few years until funding became available.

The building was commenced in 1985 and was officially opened on 25 March 1986 by the then Mayor of Wanneroo, Mr Nick Tandoss.

Once the building was opened, funds needed to be raised for necessary equipment, such as the air conditioner, part cost of the kiln for ceramics, a fridge, pool/snooker tables, indoor bowls and mats and table tennis equipment.

The Club today is run by an elected Voluntary Management Committee. All members giving freely of their time.

Many activities are available to members as part of their fees, such as badminton, indoor bowls, table tennis and pool/snooker tables, to name a few.

A variety of activities, such as keep fit, painting and ceramics are offered for a small fee to cover extra costs. Tea and coffee is available to members free of charge during Club hours.
