MESSAGES FROM THE VICE PRESIDENT

 - → Any accidents must be recorded in the Accident Report Book. This is kept in the lower cupboard situated next to the cooker in the kitchen.
- 4. It is a timely reminder that if you are attending a fellow member who might require the ambulance service, it is important they give their permission to ring for an ambulance. Of course, if they are unconscious and unable to communicate with you, an ambulance should be called immediately. Details of the member's personal emergency contact should be on their membership card in their purse or wallet.
